



My dear friends, it has been quite a challenge over the last few weeks for me in more ways than one. However, the discipline of surrender could not have come at a better time for me. With the myriad of issues-work, community, ministerial, and personal challenges, I have found that I had no choice but to surrender. As much as I would like to be in control, and as difficult as I find the discipline of surrender, I have had no choice but to let go. God has proven faithful. I continue to feel the support of your prayers and the peace that surpasses all understanding. I pray that you too have joined with me in the practice of surrender.

As we continue our Lenten Journey, I submit a second spiritual discipline for you to practice. That is the discipline of Solitudeintentional isolation. We lead such busy lives and amid the hustle and bustle of work, family, ministry, and commitments that each brings, we sometimes find that there is little time to spend with God. Squeezed from any place of prominence in our lives we find that we lack the sustenance that God provides because we have no time.

As we continue the Lenten Journey I present to you several Scriptural passages to focus on and that will help support and remind us to plan intentional time alone so that God might meet us and commune with us. Whether you choose to read all at one setting, stretch them out through the week or however you feel led. Read, reflect and respond to the following:

Luke 6:12-16, 12-16, Matthew 14:22-23, Mark 6:30-33

Luke 5:15-16, Mark 1:35-39, John 6:14-15 Jesus not only practiced the discipline of solitude, he taught or constrained his disciples to do so also (Matthew 14:22.) Not only did Jesus set the example of "going out" to be alone, his time alone was often followed by prayer and following prayer, prevailing manifestations of His power were made known.

Perhaps you are one of those who regularly carve out a time of solitude with God. You already know the strength of a relationship built on a foundation of intentional time alone with God. If you are, Bravo! You already know the benefits and you can anticipate the promise of what spending even more time with the Master might mean in your life. Prepare for a time of prayer, and the manifestations of the power of God following your time of solitude.


